Teach him if you can the wonders of books, but also give time to ponder the extreme mystery of birds in the sky, bees in the sun and flowers on a green hill.

Teach him to have faith in his own ideas, even if every one tells him they are wrong.

Try to give my son the strength not to follow the crowd when everyone else is doing it.

Teach him to listen to every one, but teach him also to filter all that he hears on a screen of truth and take only the good that comes through.

Teach him to sell his talents and brains to the highest bidder but never to put a price tag on his heart and soul.

Let him have the courage to be impatient, let him have the patience to be brave.

Teach him to have sublime faith in himself, because then he will always have sublime faith in mankind, in God.

### Celebrating Desh Apnayen Day

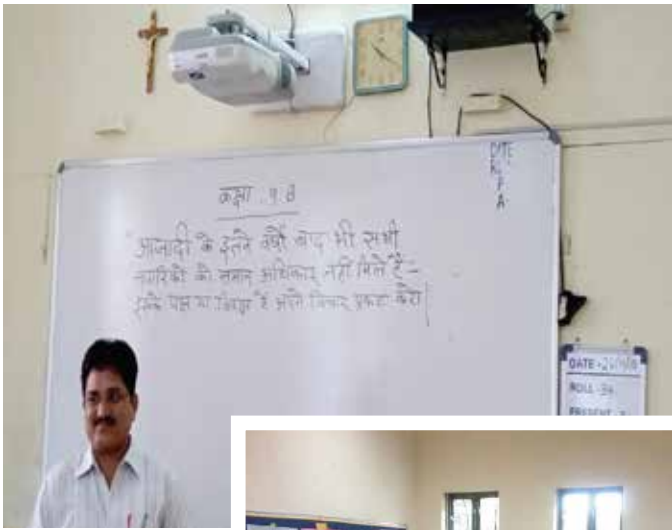

### Event of the month

For the first time ever, Saudi Arabian women won the right to vote in their country. "This is something new to women," an unidentified woman told al Ekhbariya, Saudi state television. "I am pretty sure women will have different opinions and thoughts. I am very happy." According to CNN, the December election will be the first opportunity for women to vote since a 2011 order by the now deceased King Abdullah that granted women some opportunities for political participation. According to the State Department, Abdullah issued a royal decree in 2013 mandating the Consultative Council, a royally appointed body that advises the King, be at least 20% women.
