India and the Olympics

We have had a brief romance with the Olympics. While our current record is upsetting, the only way now is upward and onward. Let's take a look back at our major achievements in the game.

HOCKEY:

India has a painfully glorious past in Olympic hockey. India has won eight gold medals at the Olympics, between 1928 and 1980. After that it has been a dry spell.

- a. 1928: This is the first time India won the gold at the Olympics, after which we went on to win the next six consecutive Olympic golds. The Indian team won the gold by defeating Holland.
- b. 1932: India defended their gold medal, this time against USA.
- c. 1936: India completed its hat-trick at Berlin.
- d. 1940: The Olympic Games that were to be held in Tokyo that year, and later moved to Helsinki, were suspended indefinitely following the outbreak of World War II.
- e. 1948: India beat Great Britain 4-0 in the final of the London Olympics. From the opening whistle, India gave the spectators in the stadium an exhibition of intelligent and fast play.
- f. 1952: India men's hockey team once again showed the world why they are supreme by outclassing Holland in the finals. Out of six goals in the finals, Balbir Singh scored 5.
- g. 1956: India defeated Pakistan 1-0 in the finals of the Melbourne Olympics and secured their sixth consecutive title.
- h. 1960: Only men competed in field hockey at the Rome Olympic Games. Pakistan won the gold medal, defeating India in the final and ending India's run of six successive gold medals. Spain won the bronze medal.
- i. 1964: India wrested back the Hockey crown from Pakistan in a thrilling game. This was the seventh gold for the Indian men's hockey team at the Olympics.

India and the Olympics

SHOOTING:

- a. Abhinav Bindra became our first individual gold medalist in the Men's 10m Air Rifle event in Beijing, 2008.
- b. Rajyavardhan Singh Rathore won a silver medal in Trap in Athens, 2004.
- c. Vijay Kumar won a silver medal in the Men's 25 Rapid Fire Pistol event in London, 2012.
- d. Gagan Narang won a bronze medal in the Men's 10m Air Rifle event in London, 2012.

BADMINTON AND TENNIS:

- a. Leander Paes won a bronze medal in Tennis Men's Singles in the 1996 Olympics in the USA.
- b. Saina Nehwal won a bronze medal in Badminton Women's Singles in the 2012 London Olympics.

BOXING, WRESTLING AND WEIGHT LIFTING

- a. Karnam Malleshwari won a silver medal in the 69kg Weightlifting event in Sydney, 2000.
- b. Mary Kom and Yogeshwar Dutt won the Bronze Medals in Boxing and Wrestling respectively at London 2012.
- c. Sushil Kumar won the silver medal in Men's 66kg Freestyle at London, 2012.

SMALL HANDS, BIG MIRACLES: PROVIDING WATER WHERE NEEDED:

The school joined hands with two very perceptive and benignant citizens of Mumbai, Mr. Obaid and Mr. Rooney to help the villagers of Vashala Village, near Shahapur in Thane District.

Though Shahapur is close to four lakes (and Vashala houses only 40 families), all the lake water is diverted to meet the demands of Mumbai, leaving these villagers with almost nothing. The only source of water for these 40 families at Vashala are the Government water tankers that make an appearance once in 6 days.

The school decided to reach out to these 40 families by distributing part of the water contributed by the students, parents and teachers. The same was dispatched to the villagers of Sahapur.

This was a very small gesture to tell the villagers that they are not alone and our little hands are making a genuine and sincere effort to reach out to them.
